Some of them require special essays to be written, a project/video to be created, or nothing more than your information for a drawing. In order to stay persistent you must focus on what you are eligible for! Great topics to write about, or create projects for, show up once in a while. But what they ALL have in common is FUNDING! Think about it, the key is eligibility!















"Writing anxiety" and "writer's block" are common terms for a wide variety of uneasy and negative feelings about writing. So, when you feel like you don't know what to say or how to put it, this is it! Take a moment and reflect on what you have learned so far; BREAK IT DOWN

5 stages of the writing process:

- 1. BRAINSTORMING for ideas, you will try to come up with as many ideas as you can. All ideas are good in a simple list...
- 2. OUTLINING based on the ideas from brainstorming; think about the structure of essay so that you can best meet requirements and question is answered...
- 3. ROUGH DRAFT shows that it's still in progress but has a clear direction of essay...
- **4. REVISE & EDIT** by organizing and looking at it in terms of your topic and ideas, add or remove as needed for better fit; check grammar...
- 5. POLISH and go over and check for errors in grammar, spelling, punctuation, and to make sure that you do not have any sentences that do not make sense...
